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WHAT IS ZERO WASTE?

THE PROBLEM

Landfills (themselves a limited resource) are a significant source of the potent greenhouse gas methane, created when organic materials like food waste decompose without oxygen. Organics, recyclables, and many other materials are resource-intensive to manufacture and limited in supply. They should instead be reused and recycled to sustain economies and healthy communities for the long term.

DEFINITION OF ZERO WASTE

Zero waste is a philosophy that promotes reuse, recycling, composting and conservation programs, and emphasizes sustainability by considering the entire life-cycle of products Source: Zero Waste North Bay zerowastenorthbay.org and systems.









The period following WWII is often considered the eruption of consumerism and consumption in the US. Marketing strategies following the Great Depression and wartime rationing aimed to sell status to the masses through material purchases. The following decades resulted in "the commodification of reality and the manufacture of demand... where, to quote philospher Herbert Marcuse, 'people recognize themselves in their commodities.'" (Kerryn Higgs, MIT Press Reader) Consumerism and the quest for convenience drive the environmental tragedies we are now facing.

STATE PROGRESS - CALIFORNIA DREAMIN'

California has been a national leader in policymaking and has enacted the most innovative, comprehensive, and stringent environmental regulations of any state since the 1970s. Yosemite was designated as the first publicly protected wilderness area in the US only 14 years after CA became a state. A federal court in 1884 in SF handed down the first environmental ruling in the US by banning hydrolic mining. CA enacted the first state air pollution control statute in 1947. In 1989, California passed AB 939 which required all California jurisdictions to divert 50% of their jurisdiction's waste stream from landfill disposal each year. In 2016, California's Short-Lived Climate Pollutant Reduction law (SB 1383) was passed and established methane reduction targets for California and sets goals to reduce disposal of organic waste in landfills and rescue edible food that would otherwise be disposed for people to eat.



SONOMA COUNTY SUSTAINABLE MATERIALS MANAGEMENT HISTORY



Zero Waste Sonoma was formed in 1992 under the name Sonoma County Waste Management Agency. The Agency re-branded in 2019 as the new name aligns with our mission. Zero Waste is a component of Sonoma County's Climate Mobilization Plan. Zero Waste Sonoma is a leader in sustainability; we have worked to make lasting changes to our community and environment. We passed the single use plastic bag ban in 2014, the Disposable Food Service Ware and Polystyrene Foam Ban Model Ordinance in 2018, the Zero Waste Resolution in 2018, and the Construction, Demolition, and Deconstruction model ordinance in 2023, expected to be adopted by jurisdictions in the coming years,,. Zero Waste Sonoma focuses on educating our community in waste diversion. We offer many tools on our website including a Zero Waste Event guide, backyard composting tips, and fun tips for reuse. We are also working diligently to bring more EPR ordinances to our county in the future. We are committed to ensuring a sustainable region without waste.

THE LAND WE'RE ON

The ZWS office is located in Santa Rosa, on the ancestral home of the Southern Pomo people. We acknowledge the profound suffering caused by the ethnic cleansing and forced removal of communities, and grieve the ongoing systemic harm to Southern Pomo culture, as well as to all the Indigenous cultures of what is now called North America. We honor the Southern Pomo as the ancestral stewards of this land. We are grateful for the Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria, the Cloverdale Rancheria of Pomo Indians of California, and the Dry Creek Rancheria Band of Pomo Indians and all those in their communities who work to protect the ecosystem of ancient home and care for Indigenous people and culture.

TWO SERVICE OPTIONS FOR BUSINESSES

Services are available for businesses that qualify as Very Small Quantity Generators as per regulations (CCR Title 22 §66260.10), which are businesses that generate 100 kilograms (27 gallons liquid or 220 pounds solid) or less of hazardous waste per month.

- Submit paperwork by fax or email to receive an appointment and pricing information.

WILL THIS PROGRAM MEET THE DISPOSAL REQUIREMENTS OF REGULATING AGENCIES?

You will receive a receipt of disposal for your records that will satisfy regulatory disposal requirements. Receipts and all records should be kept for a minimum of three years.

DOES USING THIS PROGRAM MEAN MY BUSINESS WILL BE INSPECTED FOR HAZARDOUS WASTE?

Zero Waste Sonoma is not a regulatory agency.



HOW CLEAN DO YOUR RECYCLABLES NEED TO BE?

Recyclables are economic commodities. Cleaner items are more likely to be recycled. Bottles and containers need to be empty of food and liquid. Paper needs to be clean and dry. Follow the steps below:

POUR OUT LIQUIDS

SCRAPE OUT FOOD FROM RECYCLABLES

WIPE OUT STICKY OR OILY RESIDUE FROM RECYCLABLES

GREASY, GOOEY, WET, OR FOOD-SOILED PAPER GOES IN YOUR COMPOST CART

WINDSOR ONLY



In Windsor, your recyclable materials must be separated. Put metal, glass, and plastic containers on the blue side and put cardboard and paper on the yellow side. Place shredded paper in a paper bag inside the yellow side.

TIP: KEEP CAPS ON



It is preferable to leave screw-top lids on empty plastic, glass, and metal containers. If lids are removed from the container, they are too small to be recycled.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS ACROSS CATEGORIES

HOW CLEAN DO MY RECYCLABLES REALLY NEED TO BE?

A small amount of food residue is okay, but be sure the containers are empty and dry with lids on, to avoid dirtying other materials in your bin.

WHAT SHOULD I KNOW ABOUT 1-7 PLASTIC ITEMS BASED ON THE NUMBER STAMPED FOR RECYCLING?

The numbers inside the chasing arrows symbol indicate the type of plastic that an item is made of, but does not indicate whether an item is recyclable. #1 PET is common and easily recyclable, such as clear beverage bottles, cups, and peanut butter jars. #2 HDPE is common and easily recyclable, such as detergent and shampoo bottles, as well as milk and juice jugs. #5 Polypropylene is becoming more common and these yogurt tubs, ketchup bottles, and deli/takeout containers do get recycled. #3 PVC includes clamshell containers for berries and takeout containers, which are recyclable. #4 LDPE are usually soft bags which are not recyclable curbside, #6 Polystyrene foam, and #7 Other, are low grade resins, and are problematic to recycle. Please place #4, 6, and 7 plastic in your gray garbage bin.

WHY CAN'T I PUT DVD'S, CD'S AND VHS TAPES IN MY CURBSIDE BIN?

CD and DVD discs are made of different material types, which make them very hard to recycle. VHS tapes pose a problem when placed into your curbside bin, because the tape can become loose and tangled in the equipment at the recycling facility. There are some local and mail-back options for donation and recycling, otherwise please place them in the garbage bin.

WHY CAN'T I RECYCLE PLASTIC BAGS?

Plastic bags are a kind of "tangler", along with hoses, string lights, and clothing, because they wrap around the machinery that sorts recyclables into their correct categories (e.g., glass, plastic, paper, metal). These tanglers cause delays and are a safety hazard to workers who must stop the equipment and climb in to cut them out several times a day. Please only place rigid plastics that can hold their shape into the blue bin for recycling.

WHAT ARE THE KEY CHANGES TO THE CRV PROGRAM STARTING JAN 1, 2024?

The changes add distilled spirits in aluminum, glass, plastic, or bimetal containers. It also adds wine and wine with alcohol removed in aluminum, glass, plastic, or bimetal containers. The other main additions are wine or distilled spirits contained in a box, bladder, or pouch (25 cent refund value), as well as fruit and vegetable juice.

I BOUGHT PRODUCTS LABELED "COMPOSTABLE," WHY CAN'T I PUT THEM IN THE GREEN BIN?

Compostable or "biodegradable" plastic products must be placed in the gray trash bin for two reasons: 1) Many manufacturers claim their products are compostable but they are made of regular petroleum-based plastic, which breaks down into microplastics in the finished compost, and 2) the facilities that process the green bin material from Sonoma County produce compost for growing CDFA listed/USDA Organic food, and they could lose their Organic certification because compostable plastic is considered a synthetic material.

CAN I PUT MY DOG/CAT WASTE IN THE GREEN BIN?

No, please place dog/cat poop in the gray trash bin. The compost facilities do not want dog and cat poop as there is potential for parasites to persist and end up in the finished compost, which is often used to grow food.

HOW CAN I SAFELY TRANSPORT MY HHW?


State transportation laws limit each vehicle to a maximum of 15 gallons of liquid (with a maximum of 5 gallons per container) or 125 pounds of solid material. Liquid limits are measured by the outer size of the container, not the contents. Never mix chemicals. Place items in a box in the trunk to avoid spilling. Make sure lids are on tightly.

FUN FACTS ABOUT RECYCLING

Scrap metals, tanglers (i.e. rope or hose), and film plastic cause expensive and time consuming issues. Please keep them out of your blue bin.



Our plastics, glass, and metals are sold to domestic buyers (within the U.S.). Paper and cardboard are sold to domestic and international markets.





Recycling is real! We hear all the time "don't you just throw it all in the landfill?" That is a rumor. With Recology Sonoma Marin's new MRF we have a 85% recovery rate so far and that is just anticipated to go up.

Single-use coffee cups and lids should be put in the garbage bin. These cups cannot be recycled or composted due to the inner lining. We recommend bringing your own mug to your coffee shop. Paper cup sleeves may be recycled.

CLOTHING SWAPS, ROUND ROBINS, AND MENDING

Do you want to refresh your wardrobe? Consider hosting or attending a clothing swap instead of shopping on the internet! Bring together folks from your community to bond and share the pieces you aren't reaching for from your closet. Many people find it easier to part with items that no longer suit their use when they know they will be worn and appreciated by someone else.

Round robins are another option for exchanging clothing! Size-based round robins organized through neighborhood groups allow sharing of resources with a lower barrier to entry. One person picks up the load of clothing to bring home and try them on, keeps what works, and adds whatever they are ready to share. Simply coordinate with the next person on the list and pass it off to them.

THE PROBLEM OF TEXTILE WASTE

Textiles are the fastest growing component of California's landfills, comprising 3% of total landfilled waste, and the fifth most common material overall. In 2021, about 1.2 million tons of textiles were disposed of, costing California taxpayers more than \$70 million. The textile industry is considered a top industrial polluter, because in addition to the methane created by decomposing textiles in landfills, the industry creates about 10% of global carbon emissions. In addition, the culture of "fast fashion," or creating cheap and low-quality clothes designed to be worn a few times and then disposed of, harms the environment surrounding the production facilities, exploits workers, and harms animals.

Some clothing brands have begun to respond to this crisis by committing to increased use of recycled fibers or garment repair and resale programs. Support these programs and companies that are considering their impact!

ZERO WASTE EVENT CHECKLIST

EVENTS CAN BE WASTEFUL, BUT THERE ARE A NUMBER OF STRATEGIES THAT CAN REDUCE THE WASTE PRODUCED FROM LARGE GATHERINGS. THESE TIPS CAN APPLY TO A SMALL DINNER PARTY. A BACKYARD WEDDING, OR A LARGE CONCERT.

EVENT SERVICES, ZERO WASTE STATIONS, EVENT GREENING:

Make a Zero Waste Plan

- At least 30 days prior to event, order recycling, composting, and trash collection services.
- Request or create event signage for your bins.
- Order dumpsters or metal bins that have locks to avoid contamination or dumping.
- Map out where zero waste stations and debris stations will be located.
- Plan to purchase your event inventory around waste prevention (tip: this will lower disposal fees).
- Determine how materials will be monitored and sorted after the event.
- Schedule pickups for leftover food and other donations.
- Determine how materials will be transported from zero waste stations to debris boxes.

Setting up zero waste (bin) stations

- Stations should be clearly marked and visible above a crowd.
- Recycling, composting, and trash bins should always be grouped together with proper labeling.
 - If you do use liners (compostable or plastic) at the end of the event, all material must be loose in the appropriate container. Liners should be removed and placed in the landfill if needed.

FOODWARE AND HYDRATION STATIONS:

Foodware

- Plastic stirrers, toothpicks, and beverage plugs are banned. Acceptable alternatives include paper, wood, and other natural fiber.
- All food and beverage accessories like lids, cutlery, and napkins are to be provided upon request OR at a self-serve station.
 - Distribution of single-use plastic straws including, compostable plastic ones are restricted. Acceptable alternatives include paper and other natural fiber.
- All straws may only be made available upon request i.e. behind the counter.
- Foodware provided must be reusable, recyclable, or compostable.
- Compostable foodware must be made of fiber only, GreenScreen Certified for safer chemicals, and BPI Certified Compostable.

Hydration Stations

- Hydration stations serve as an alternative for bottled and packaged water.
- Contact your permitting agency to find out how to access water for your event.

Working with Food Vendors

- Include zero waste requirements into vendors contracts.
- Educate vendors/janitorial staff/volunteers on the zero waste requirements and procedures.

REUSABLES:

- Provide, lend, or sell reusable beverage cups to event attendees.
- Promote or incentivize attendees to bring their own reusable beverage cup.

The recycling industry is controlled by economics of supply and demand. When you buy goods made with recycled content, your purchases help create a demand for materials collected in recycling programs.

Remember to ask stores you frequent which products they carry are made with post-consumer content. This means the product was made from materials that were used and recycled by consumers, rather than from virgin material.

There are many things you can do to reduce your trash footprint. Make a pledge to continue doing the things you already do, and choose new actions you are willing to commit to. For example:

DID YOU KNOW THAT USED MOTOR OIL **NEVER WEARS OUT? IT JUST GETS DIRTY** AND CAN BE RECYCLED, CLEANED, AND USED AGAIN. Place your motor oil in a drain pan or sealed see-through reusable container you take back with you. Some sites offer a 40¢ per gallon rebate for used motor oil.

VISIT SITES DURING BUSINESS HOURS. ABANDONING OIL OR ANY OTHER SUBSTANCE IN ANY QUANTITY AFTER HOURS IS NOT RECYCLING! IT IS ILLEGAL, PUNISHABLE BY IMPRISONMENT OR A FINE UP TO \$10,000.

- Sites typically accept no more than 5 gallons of used motor oil and 2 filters at one time.
- 1 or 2 oil filters are usually accepted for free; some locations charge up to \$3.
- · Antifreeze fees range from no cost to \$3/gallon.

ABOUT CONTAMINATED OIL

Sites will not accept used motor oil that has been contaminated with other fluids such as antifreeze, solvents, gasoline, or water. 

POLICY

AB 827 COMMERCIAL ORGANICS AND RECYCLING BINS

CUSTOMER ACCESS TO RECYCLING: REQUIRES BUSINESSES TO MAKE COMPOSTING AND RECYCLING BINS ACCESSIBLE TO CUSTOMERS AT RESTAURANTS, MALLS, AND OTHER BUSINESSES.



Commercial businesses that serve food for immediate consumption must provide customers access to organic collection bins on the premises. Organics bins must be in addition and adjacent to recycling and trash. Bins must be correctly and clearly marked with educational signage indicating what can and cannot go into each bin. Full service restaurants are exempt as long as the bins are provided to employees.

SB 54

DETAILS ABOUT SB 54

- Packaging waste comprises 27% of CA landfill waste.
- Taxpayers and local governments spend over \$420 million annually to clean up and prevent litter.
- This law aims to eliminate single-use products and packaging that are not reusable, recyclable, or compostable in California facilities by 2032.
- The recycling rates for all plastic packaging and foodservice material must meet the specified rate of 65% by January 1, 2032. Interim targets are 30% by January 1, 2028, and 50% by January 1, 2028.
- It will require the state to develop compliance regulation and incentives for encouraging in-state manufacturing using recycled materials generated in California.
- This law is still in the rulemaking process, and will have an impact mostly on producers, however, the effects of SB 54 will ripple down to the general public.

LOCAL ORDINANCES COMING SOON: CONSTRUCTION & DEMOLITION

About 30% of our local landfill waste stream is comprised of material from construction sites, most of which can be recycled or salvaged in some way. The ZWS board passed the Building Project Materials Management, Deconstruction, Reuse and Recycling Requirements model ordinance in 2023, and in 2024, Sonoma County jurisdictions will consider adopting it into municipal code to require all projects to separate and recover all asphalt, concrete, plant, and tree debris. It will also require that buildings constructed in 1923 or earlier, or are designated as historic, must be carefully deconstructed as opposed to mechanically demolished, to salvage as much material as possible. Keeping building materials in circulation for secondary use and in new construction jobs is an important step to reducing the embodied carbon associated with the built environment, developing affordable and sustainable housing, preserving historical and cultural structures, expanding the local reuse economy through job creation, and extending the life of our landfill.



BUSINESS LAWS & ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

DISPOSABLE FOOD SERVICE WARE AND POLYSTYRENE FOAM BAN MODEL ORDINANCE

APPLIES TO FOOD/BEVERAGE PROVIDERS, RETAILERS, SPECIAL EVENT PROMOTERS, GOVERNMENT ENTITIES, CONTRACTORS, AND LESSEES.

Jurisdictions in Sonoma County have implemented a model ordinance to ban the sale of certain polystyrene foam products and limit the use of non-recyclable or non-compostable disposable food ware. Please confirm specific requirements within your jurisdiction.

ABOUT THE MODEL ORDINANCE

- Prohibits polystyrene foam food ware and foodware containing per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) distributed by food and beverage providers.
- Prohibits polystyrene foam food ware and specified polystyrene foam products sold by retail stores.
- Requires food/beverage providers and some special events to use locally compostable or recyclable single-use food service ware and accessories.
- Requires food/beverage providers to provide single-use straws, lids, cutlery, and to-go condiment packages only upon request.
- Encourages use of reusables.

POLYSTYRENE FOAM IS BANNED



ORDINANCE NO. 2014-2 WASTE REDUCTION PROGRAM FOR CARRYOUT BAGS ORDINANCE

APPLIES TO ALL GROCERY STORES AND RETAIL ESTABLISHMENTS.



- Prohibits all single-use plastic carryout bags (point-of-sale or checkout).
- Requires a minimum 10¢ charge on all compliant recycled paper
- Charges must be displayed separately on customer receipt.
- Stores to keep the charge.



PREVENT FOOD LOSS AND SAVE MONEY

USE THESE TIPS TO PREVENT THE PROBLEM OF FOOD LOSS BEFORE IT BEGINS.



CHECK YOUR SUPPLIES BEFORE SHOPPING to use up the food you have.

STICK TO A GROCERY LIST to avoid impulsive buying. Don't shop when you're hungry.

PROACTIVELY FREEZE bread, vegetables, dairy, and meat before they go bad if you don't go through the food fast enough.

DRY OR FERMENT extra food. Learn more through the Master Food Preservers: https://ucanr.edu/sites/ MFPSC/

BUY A VARIETY OF FOOD to

have nutritious meals available through the week. Some foods last longer than others. Vegetables like leafy greens and mushrooms spoil more quickly than root vegetables and squashes so eat those first.

PURCHASE FOOD THAT IS IN

SEASON for the greatest value, the least embedded food miles, and longevity of shelf life. Further, consider purchasing from local farmers and markets first when planning your shopping; that ensures seasonality, freshness, minimal packaging, and maximum impact on the local economy.

WHAT IS SB 1383?

IN EFFECT SINCE JAN 1, 2022, SENATE BILL 1383 IS A COMPREHENSIVE STATE LAW AIMED AT REDUCING GREENHOUSE GAS EMISSIONS TO SLOW CLIMATE CHANGE.

THE STATE DEFINES ORGANICS AS FOOD, GREEN MATERIALS, LANDSCAPE/PRUNINGS, NON-HAZARDOUS WOOD SCRAP, AND FOOD-SOILED PAPER.

WHAT THIS MEANS FOR YOU

- All residents and commercial entities are required to subscribe to curbside organics collection (green bin) service in addition to recycling and garbage.
- All residents and commercial entities must separate food scraps, plant trimmings, food-soiled paper, and other organic materials from the garbage and place them into the green bin to be sent for composting.
- Commercial entities include for-profit and nonprofit organizations, public and private schools, government buildings, and multifamily residential dwellings.

THE PROBLEM WITH BIODEGRADABLE AND COMPOSTABLE PLASTIC PRODUCTS

Plates, bowls, cups, utensils, bags, or other food service ware labeled **biodegradable** or **compostable** cannot be composted in the backyard or placed in curbside green carts. Backyard compost piles don't reach high enough temperatures to break them down. Industrial composting facilities cannot easily distinguish these products from conventional plastic products, so they are screened out and sent to the landfill. Please choose reusable items whenever possible and place compostable plastic products in the garbage cart.

In addition, large food producing entities, called Tier I and Tier II Entities under the law, are required to donate excess food to feed people.

Food must be safe to eat, whole, unserved, and/or in unopened and original packaging although they might be blemished, less marketable, or slightly stale.

REPAIR AND REUSE

WHAT ARE REUSE + REPAIR FAIRS?

Reuse and Repair Fairs are community events that raise awareness about the benefits of reuse and provide free repair services while supporting the local reuse economy.

Attendees bring items in need of repair (textiles, electronics, small appliances, lamps, bikes, etc.) and are assigned to a volunteer or professional repair coach who fixes the item while teaching the owner. The repair portion is often partnered with a swap (clothes, puzzles, etc.) where visitors can bring items to exchange and with other reuse services, education and activities.

Fluorescent lamps contain mercury vapor. Although the amount of mercury vapor in each lamp is small, care should still be taken in handling and disposing of fluorescent lamps.

WHAT IF A LAMP BREAKS?

- Open a window and leave the room for 15 minutes or more.
- Turn off central heat/air conditioning.
- Do not vacuum. Instead, collect the pieces using a stiff piece of paper, such as an index card.
- Pat the area with the sticky side of packing tape to remove glass
- Put all material into a sealed container.


FREE PAINT PICK UP REUSE LOCKER AT CENTRAL DISPOSAL SITE

House paint and primers (latex or oil-based) • Stains • Deck and concrete sealers • Clear finishes (e.g., varnishes, shellac)

• Original containers with labels that can be read • Sealed containers • Containers 5 gallons or less in size

NOT ACCEPTED: Leaking or open containers • Empty containers (dried latex paint okay) • Containers over 5 gallons

SHARPS/NEEDLES

SB 212 PHARMACEUTICAL AND SHARPS STEWARDSHIP BILL

IN 2018, CALIFORNIA PASSED THE PHARMACEUTICAL AND SHARPS STEWARDSHIP BILL REQUIRING PRODUCERS OF PHARMACEUTICALS AND SHARPS TO MANAGE AND OPERATE A COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL PROGRAM. THE STEWARDSHIP PROGRAMS HAVE ROLLED OUT ACROSS THE STATE. HERE'S HOW TO PROPERLY DISPOSE OF SHARPS **UNDER THE NEW LAW:**

MAIL-BACK

Mail-back options are dependent on your retailer (pharmacy, online provider, veterinarian, etc.) that provided you with sharps. All disposal options are free. **Option 1:** the retailer has a supply of mail-back sharps waste containers and will provide it to you with the purchase of sharps. Option 2: the retailer will ask a stewardship program to send a mail-back sharps waste container to your home address. As this is a new program, it is best to ask your sharps retailer how to receive a mailback waste container at the point of purchase of sharps. Option 3: order a sharps container online at https://sharpstakebackcalifornia.org.

If your sharps retailer doesn't participate with a stewardship program yet, you may contact the organization below.

DANGER TO WORKERS

WHAT'S THE PROBLEM



California State Law makes it illegal to dispose of home-generated sharps in the garbage or recycling bin.

This includes hypodermic needles, pen needles, intravenous needles, lancets, and other devices that are used to penetrate the skin for delivery of medications used in the care of people and animals.

When placed in the garbage or recycling bin, sharps can injure sanitation workers.

DROP-OFF AT HHW PROGRAMS

HHW facilities are allowed to accept sharps under SB 212. To drop-off, follow these instructions:

- For drop-off, sharps must be in FDA-approved sharps containers.
- The only legal way to transport used sharps is in an FDA-approved sharps container.
- The container must be labeled **Sharps Waste** and Biohazard.
- Sharps waste will <u>not</u> be accepted in paper bags, plastic bags, or non-approved containers.
- Household Hazardous Waste programs will not accept sharps that contain controlled substances.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

BIODEGRADABLE Capable of being broken down especially into innocuous products by the action of living things (such as microorganisms).

CARBON FOOTPRINT The amount of greenhouse gases and specifically carbon dioxide emitted by something (such as a person's activities or a product's manufacture and transport) during a given period.

CATHODE RAY TUBE (CRT) A vacuum tube containing one or more electron guns, which emit electron beams that are manipulated to display images on a phosphorescent screen. This technology is used in older televisions and computer monitors.

CIRCULAR ECONOMY A system where materials never become waste and nature is regenerated. In a circular economy, products and materials are kept in circulation through processes like maintenance, reuse, refurbishment, remanufacture, recycling, and composting.

COMPOST (verb) To convert (a material, such as plant debris) to compost; (noun) A mixture that consists largely of decayed organic matter and is used for adding beneficial microbes and nutrients to the soil.

DECONSTRUCTION An alternative to demolition that calls for buildings to be carefully and systematically dismantled or disassembled, and for the salvageable components to be sorted for future donation, sale, or reuse & recycling.

DIVERSION Materials and items not sent to the landfill, and instead reused, recycled, composted, or otherwise kept in a circular economy.

ECOSYSTEM A geographic area where plants, animals, and other organisms, as well as weather and landscapes, coexist and have mutually beneficial relationships.

EXTENDED PRODUCER RESPONSIBILITY (EPR) A policy approach that assigns producers responsibility for the end-of-life of products.

GREEN BUILDING The practice of creating structures and using processes that are environmentally responsible and resource-efficient throughout a building's life-cycle from siting to design, construction, operation, maintenance, renovation, and deconstruction.

HAZARDOUS WASTE A waste with properties that make it potentially dangerous or harmful to human health or the environment that must be disposed with additional precautions.

LANDFILL A place to dispose of refuse and other waste material by burying it and covering it over with soil, and lined with plastic tarp or sheeting. Modern landfills are carefully engineered with pipes and filters to capture water runoff and gas leakage to minimize environmental harm, but they are still a significant source of greenhouse gas emissions.

MATERIAL RECOVERY FACILITY (MRF) A specialized facility that takes in commingled recyclable materials and separates them by material type (e.g., glass, plastic, paper) mechanically or by hand, before each material type is sent to secondary processing facilities (e.g. paper mill) which create new products.

MUNICIPAL SOLID WASTE (MSW) Also called "trash" or "garbage," and sent to a landfill, this category of waste generally refers to common household waste, as well as office and retail wastes, but excludes industrial, hazardous, and construction wastes.

ORGANICS MATERIALS Food scraps, plant trimmings, wood, or anything that came from a living thing.

PLASTIC A material consisting of synthetic or semi-synthetic material typically derived from petrochemicals or substances such as cellulose or starch. Plastic is extremely versatile and durable, only breaking down into smaller pieces but may take hundreds to thousands of years to decompose.

RECYCLABLE Materials that can be received in local systems, and have end markets for reprocessing.

REUSE Using of an object or material again and again for the same purpose or for a different purpose without altering the form of the product.

SOLAR PANEL A panel designed to absorb the sun's rays as a source of energy for generating electricity or heating.

SUSTAINABILITY Avoidance of the depletion of natural resources in order to maintain an ecological balance.

VERMICOMPOSTING A process that relies on earthworms and microorganisms to help stabilize active organic materials and convert them to a valuable soil amendment and source of plant nutrients.



BACK COVER ANSWERS

WHY DOES COMPOST CONTAMINATION MATTER?

You've heard of the phrase, "farm to table," but the reverse is also true, "table to farm"! When you place food scraps and plant trimmings into your green bin, they are turned into compost, which farmers, ranchers, and home gardeners use to grow more food.

Unfortunately, we're seeing an increase in the number of noncompostable items ending up in the green bin, the most problematic being plastic and glass. Neither decompose, only breaking into smaller and smaller pieces until it's impossible to separate them from the rest of the compost. Plastics potentially leach toxins into the soil and water, while glass can cut someone working in the backyard or the cattle who graze on fields.

Please place only what you would want in your garden and your food into the green bin! For everything else, please check the guides from your hauler on what items should be placed in what bins, or send us your questions at zerowastesonoma@sonoma-county.org.

BACK COVER CONTAMINATED COMPOST ACTIVITY

Items that DO belong in the green bin:

Leaves, twigs, and branches, flowers, eggshells, banana peels, pizza box, bread – this one was a trick question! The bread should be placed in the green bin, but the plastic bag should be removed and placed in the trash.

Items that DON'T belong in the green bin:

- 1. T-shirt Most fabrics contain a mix of synthetic and natural fibers, which means they break down into microplastics. Clothing also jams and tangles up the shredding equipment at compost facilities. Clothing can be repaired, donated, or recycled through special programs instead. See page 10. Otherwise, please place clothing in the gray trash bin.
- 2. Skateboard It may just look like wood, but skateboards also have layers of glue, paint, plastic, and metal that make them hard to recycle. If it can't be donated or repurposed, please place them in the gray trash bin.
- 3. Pet waste Animal poop can have parasites, and we don't want those to end up in the garden where people grow food. Please place all pet waste and their bags in the gray trash bin.
- 4. Books Please donate books to the library or a friend! If they can no longer be read, please place the hard cover in the gray trash bin and the pages in the blue recycling bin.
- 5. Plastic bag We don't want plastic in the garden. If you can't reuse the plastic bag for pet waste or as a trash bag, please place them in the gray trash bin.
- 6. Coffee cup Although the cup looks like paper, it also has layers of plastic and a plastic lid. Please place coffee cups in the gray trash bin.
- 7. Lightbulbs Bulbs will break, and we don't want glass in the garden! Bulbs need to be specially recycled as hazardous waste. See page 26.
- 8. Cellphone Electronic wastes like cellphones, tablets, and computers have metals, glass, and plastic that should must be specially recycled. See page 24.
- 9. Utensils Plastic disposable utensils will break down into microplastics we don't want in the garden. Please place them in the gray trash bin.
- 10. Basketball Basketballs and other sports equipment are usually made of a combination of rubber and plastic. If they can't be donated, please place them in the gray trash bin.
- 11. Soda bottle Just like lightbulbs, bottles will break! We don't want glass in the garden. Please place soda bottles, cans, or other glass containers in the blue recycling bin. See page 7.
- 12. Batteries In addition to metal, batteries contain chemicals that are hazardous and so they must be specially recycled. See page 23.
- 13. Shoes Shoes are a mixture of fabric, plastic, rubber, and other materials. If they can't be donated or repaired, please place them in the gray trash bin.
